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Palliative vs. Curative Care

GOAL: To educate healthcare professionals about the differences between palliative and curative care while exploring the history and philosophy of the hospice movement. - 3. Hospice care is a specialized type of palliative care designed to improve quality of life for patients in their last six months of life, and it may include disease-modifying therapy as appropriate.
- 4. The early administration of palliative care offers tangible benefits to patient and provider, including improved survival rates, decreased burdensome transitions, patient and family satisfaction, and reduced 30-day readmissions, lengths of stay and ICU utilization.
- 5. Timely referral to hospice care reduces hospital readmissions, avoids invasive procedures at the end of life, manages patients' pain and symptoms, relieves burdens on families/caregivers and meets patients' preferences to die comfortably at home.
- 6. Hospice offers bereavement support for the family for up to 13 months following the death of a loved one.



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
